What Condition is your Mental Motorcycling Condition In??


Initially, last month when I discussed my safety tip of what we can do in the non-riding months to improve our riding skills, I was limited in scope to looking at stop gap things to plug into what we do during the rest of our riding year. I wasn't "AWARE" of our need to see 'what condition our mental motorcycling condition is in all year long! We've heard of the term, "Mindfulness" or where our mind is in the present or at the moment. The awareness we are looking for is called, "in the moment awareness" or in real time as opposed to "historical awareness" which means you understand yourself and how you've reacted to certain situations in the past.



Other types of mindful conditions we need to be cognizant of as motorcyclists is when we say you are "in your head" or "in your

body". In your head means you are thinking, remembering, analyzing, daydreaming or mentally wandering here and there. It means you are preoccupied with other important issues and are disconnected from your body and your senses and from your bike. "In your body" means your senses, seeing, smelling and notice what is happening in real time. You are connected to your bike, the driving surface, the conditions, and what is happening around you. You will be able to anticipate hazards and situations that arise and overall be in control of your riding experience.

But our awareness does not come automatically every time you get on your bike. Many things block awareness. Emotions, reaction to life events, physical ill-




will cause us to lose touch with our senses and lose touch with awareness of the present. When we think of things in the past and in the future and come back to the "in the moment awareness", we are not 100% in the moment. There is a bit of time where we were not fully paying attention to our body, bike, or the road. We were not hearing or seeing critical changes in our riding experience and so we cannot make the proper adjustments.

The bottom line is we need a sharp mental focus and awareness when riding a motorcycle. Riding demands constant concentration and a filter that restricts distractions and allows us to stay focused on the road ahead. Skilled motorcyclists need to mentally rehearse maneuvers in their mind before executing them.

Remember, mental preparation is just as crucial as physical skills when it comes to mastering the art of motorcycling.

Do you know what condition your mental motorcycling condition is? (Based on the 1967 song by the First Edition, "Just dropped in to see what condition my condition was in")

California Bill Threatens Speed **Governors on New Vehicles**



In an effort to curtail road deaths in his state, California Senator • Scott Wiener (D-San Francisco) introduced SB961, recently. • The bill is part of the Speeding and Fatality Emergency Reduction on California Streets (SAFER California Streets) package.

SB961 would mandate a manufacturer-installed speed limiter on all new vehicles beginning with the 2027 model year.

The speed governor would arrive in the form of smart devices that could automatically cap a vehicle's speed to just 10 miles above the posted legal limit. The bill would exempt emergency vehicles and would also allow the Commissioner of the California Highway Patrol to authorize the system to be disabled on other vehicles based on specified, as yet undisclosed criteria.

Senator Wiener said. "There is no reason for anyone to be going over 100 miles per hour on a public road, yet in 2020, California Highway Patrol issued over 3000 tickets for just The CVO Road Glide ST is the fastest and mostthat offense."

According to a recent report from TRIP, a national transportation research nonprofit, between 2019 and 2022, California traffic deaths increased by 22 percent. Nationwide, the figure was 19 percent.

Speed governors are nothing new. Many semi-trucks and fleet vehicles come equipped with them. Many new private vehicles, too, including new Volvos (112 mph), already have speed limiters on them

The technology proposed uses GPS to verify local speed limits and prevent cars from going 10 miles per hour over that threshold. Among a number of unanswered questions, it's unclear from the language of the bill how this would impact cars used, for example, as daily drivers during the week and then for track days on the weekend.



New I-PASS stickers replace Illinois Tollway transponders



Illinois riders are set for a big change when it comes to the Tollway.

That clunky I-PASS transponder on your windshield will soon be a thing of the past as the Illinois Tollway says transponder boxes will soon be replaced with radio frequency identification (RFID) sticker tags.

The new stickers were first made available at oases, participating Jewel-Osco stores and the Tollway's headquarters on Jan. 26, but they will also be available for online ordering by February.

"I-PASS Sticker Tags mark the latest advance in toll collection," Illinois Tollway Executive Director Cassaundra Rouse said in a statement. "Sticker tags are being adopted by toll agencies across the country and by the Illinois Tollway as they provide a convenient and reliable and travel experience for our customers."

According to officials, 19 states are part of the E-ZPass program, and the tag will work for all of those states.

Unlike transponders, there will be no deposit fee, according to the Tollway. Drivers will also be able to receive multiple stickers to link to the same I-PASS account, meaning that stickers won't have to be moved between vehicles.

What to do if you already have a transponder

Current transponders will remain active until their designated expiration date.

The stickers can be used immediately on the Illinois Tollway system, though officials say that there may be a 24hour (Continued on page 6)

waiting period for use on the Chicago Skyway or for other states that are on the E-ZPass system.

What to do with your old transponder


The Tollway asked customers to dispose of old I-PASS transponders in "an environmentally sound way." Drivers can return them to the Illinois Tollway or go to the Earth911 website, search by "lithium-ion batteries" and enter a zip code to find available recycling locations.

Where should you put your new sticker?

"I-PASS Sticker Tags are required to be mounted to a vehicle's windshield near the rearview mirror," according to the Tollway, "and, they are not designed to be moved between vehicles. There is no battery, and they last until removed from the vehicle."

Note: It seems that you can put it on your helmet and ride any bike that you want to. Hmmmmm

Florida passes bill to ban left lane driving

The Florida legislature has passed a bill that would ban motorists from cruising in the left lane of highways, sending it to Gov. Ron De-Santis for his signature.



"If someone in the left lane is

going slower, and you pass them (on the right), you are creating an infraction, and you can get ticketed," bill sponsor state Sen. Keith Perry (R) said.

Ride Planning: Too Long, Too Short.

When on tour I often get this question from my pillion partner at the beginning of each day's ride: How many miles are we riding today? Sometimes, if we're just letting the road be our guide, I don't really know. But usually, I've planned the route and know the answer, not counting any side trips that may strike our fancy along the way. This exchange, however, often makes me wonder what the ideal touring mileage is for a day in the saddle. In deciding that number, though, there are obviously a number of factors to consider:

Riding Environment

Weather: Because of the more exposed nature of motorcycle touring (versus a car), checking the weather forecast each morning is a regimen followed by most experienced riders. For example, the expectation of thunderstorms may dictate altering the day's route to avoid them. But much of the weather experienced on tour can't be avoided in advance. Many of us have had to ride out unexpected thunderstorms in a café or some other protected structure. And fore the "No Vacancy" signs start lighting up. even riding in a non-threatening steady rain usually means reduced visibility and a slower average speed.

Besides storms, very hot or cold weather may dictate more stops than originally planned for hydration or warming up with a hot drink. High winds can also affect travel mileage. In Wyoming exceptionally strong, steady cross winds required riding slower than normal highway speeds and keeping the bike leaned into the wind to counteract nature's strong embrace. Weather is always a wild card on any motorcycle trip, which can slow the rider's rate of progress.

Terrain: Mountainous terrain usually means more said...."Nice truck, where you from?" curves—and more smiles—than flat prairie, but lots of curves invariably results in a slower average speed. A twohundred-mile ride in the mountains will take noticeably longer than a comparable distance with few curves, and it usually will be more tiring. Also, mountainous terrain is often more scenic, inviting more stops to enjoy it.

And then there's the situation when riders want to get to the most desirable riding area as quickly as possible. To maximize their riding time, riders crossing desert or prairie often want to cover a lot of miles in the shortest amount of In reality, there is no optimum number of miles to cover time. Because that can't be done on backroads, the super slab is probably their best bet. Terrain is an important consideration in planning the day's distance.

Type/Condition of Roads: Paved versus unpaved roads what is enjoyable!

will make a large difference in mileage each day. A 100-mile day astride an adventure bike on challenging, unpaved roads takes much longer and more energy than riding several hundred miles on pavement. Also, where roadways are often in poor condition after severe winters, average speed on rough pavement is always slower than on smooth tarmac.

Traffic and Construction Delays: Construction delays on rural two-lane roads and bridges during the warmer months can put a big dent in a rider's

rate of progress. There are websites that can alert riders to construction projects, many of those construction zones appear with little warning. We've been stopped on a twolane road on the expansive plains of South Dakota, where the flagman was out of sight, from the other end of the construction zone. We waited quite a while for the pilot truck to arrive and guide us at low speed along the single lane of new, hot, asphalt.

Touring & Travel Goals

Reservations: Reserved lodging is an advantage. Riders know they have a place to bed down regardless of their arrival time. This is comforting when unexpected delays cause the ride to take longer than planned. This may be caused by severe weather, bad roads, mechanical problems, etc. Reservations can always be cancelled, unless it's too late.

When traveling without room reservations, start looking for a hotel no later than around 4:00 p.m., or even earlier, be-

Planned and Unplanned Stops: Plan one or two interesting stops each day, which typically include museums, battlefields, national or state parks, historical sites, etc. And then there are those unplanned, surprise stops, which make motorcycle touring spontaneous and enjoyable.

It's not always places or things that prolong an unplanned stop, but the interesting people you meet along the way. Riding a motorcycle cross-country frequently triggers conversations with curious strangers that won't happen in a car. Nobody has ever come up to me at a gas station and

Preferences of Other Riders and Passengers: Riding with others means that their preferences have to be considered in planning the day's route and distance. Some riders only want to hit the twisties for as long and intensely as possible each day. Other riders want a more relaxed ride, stopping to rest frequently. Rather than frustrating one or both sets of folks, a good idea may be to split into two riding groups, taking different routes to the same destination.

each day on any ride.

Just like any activity, it depends on the group, the weather, the riding conditions and, above all, the freedom to do


