

sides and rear as indicated by the red shaded areas in this picture.

A combination of mirror checks and physically looking at the blind spot should always be done before executing any maneuver.

Checking the blind spot also requires looking behind, which in itself is hazardous if you don't clear the highway ahead first.

Experienced riders will always check their blind spots before:

- moving off from a stationary position
- making left or right turns
- making lane changes
- overtaking
- slowing down
- stopping

Larger vehicles will have larger blind spots. The blue shaded areas signify areas where a semi truck cannot see in their mirrors or cannot see due to the bulk of the vehicle.

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If you cannot see the driver, chances are they cannot see you either. Experienced riders keep a good distance from larger vehicles where the driver is less likely to see you, by passing quickly or changing lanes.

Be mindful that in our vision there is a small portion of the visual field of each eye where there are no photoreceptors in the optic disk, and, therefore, there is no image detection in this area. A driver can look, and completely NOT SEE a motorcycle if it lands in this part of the driver's peripheral vision. This is often why we hear "I didn't even see him".

Many newer vehicles have a blind – spot warning system that illuminates a signal on their external mirrors when a vehicle is in their blind spot. Once again, experienced riders will look for that signal when approaching a vehicle as an indicator that they are now in that vehicle's blind spot and move to where they can safely be seen.

We take many precautions to be sure that we are visible to other vehicles. Federal law requires reflectors, some wear bright safety vests, we have hi intensity headlights, turn signals and taillights all of which are totally useless if you are riding in a vehicle's blind spot.

Be conscious of blind spots, stay out of blind spots and the result will be a much higher probability of being seen.



Harley-Davidson Push the Limit Series Season 2

The 2023 MotoAmerica King of The Baggers series came down to the final race of the final round in New Jersey, with Vance & Hines Harley-Davidson rider Hayden Gillim completing a dream double title to go with the MotoAmerica Stock 1000 crown he took earlier in Texas.

It was a dramatic occasion, with the rider everyone expected to be the one taking the title for H-D, Kyle Wyman, having to settle for third in the points behind Gillim and second placed, James Rispoli.

Harley-Davidson documented everything that year, from the first test to the final checkered flag in NJ, and put together a brilliant six chapter, second series on YouTube called *Push The Limit*, all of which you can see right here. https://youtu.be/uAdIVTJ-mnA



The series delves into the workings of the very first King of The Baggers Street Glide racer that Gillim used at Laguna Seca in 2020, very much a road bike with bits ripped off it compared to the bagger superbike he's racing now. It's amazing to see how far the engineering has come.

Push The Limit highlights mainly the factory team of the brothers Wyman, Kyle and Travis, and the Vance & Hines team of Rispoli and Gillim, but also gives light to the Saddleman team that ran Cory West, Patricia Fernandez, Jake Lewis and Frankie Garcia in what is the biggest outfit in the bagger paddock. The series takes you into the personal lives of each H-D rider, giving an insight into what makes them tick and gives a feeling of cohesiveness between the rivals, who all want to win.

This is very much Harley-Davidson's view of how the 2023 King of The Baggers season unfolded, so don't expect any words from their chief rivals Tyler O'Hara and Jeremy McWilliams on the factory Indian Challenger which is Harley's lethal competitor. (Continued on pg. 5)

Ways to Stay Safe on a Motorcycle

Consider these motorcycle safety tips to help avoid the risk of accidents and stay safe on the road.

According to the National Safety Council, during 2020, despite the fact that motorcycles represented 3% of all registered vehicles, they accounted for 14% of all vehicle fatalities. That makes it all the more important to do what you can to help keep you and other motorcycle riders safe.

Reminder tips for motorcycle safety and accident prevention

Gear up

Wear long pants and sleeves made of leather or another thick, protective material, as well as gloves, eye protection and durable boots that cover your ankles. When it gets colder, don't forget to add layers or heavier gear designed for those temperatures.

Be seen

Help increase your visibility by trying the following: Wear bright colors, add reflective elements to both your clothing and bike, use your headlight (day or night), ride in the section of lane that makes you most visible to motorists, and consider honking if you're not sure a motorist sees you.

Wear a helmet

Wear a Department of Transportation-approved helmet — preferably light-colored, for maximum visibility. Be alert

Texting motorists are a very real danger, so be prepared for sudden lane changes and swerves. Watch for patches of sand, potholes, railroad tracks and other road hazards, as well as fellow motorcyclists.

still a great watch to get you In 2020, 35% of accidents occurred at intersecup to speed on the Harley-Davidson side of King tions. A motorist turning left in front of you is perhaps the most common cause, so be extra cautious when driving through an intersection.

Don't drink or speed

Driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs and speeding are some of the most common causes for motorcycle accidents in our country. Staying sober and observing the speed limit can help you arrive safely at your destination.

Avoid bad weather

Study up on safe ways to ride in the rain, wind or whatever type of challenge Mother Nature tends to offer in your particular locale. If rain is in the forecast and you have to ride, pack rain gear to help stay dry and comfortable.

Get educated

It's a good idea for experienced riders to take refresher courses, too. The MSF offers classes online and in person — some of which could net you an insurance discount.

A heads-up for motorists

Some collisions with motorcycles might be the car truckdriver's fault. Remember, motorcyclists have the same rights as other drivers. Check your blind spot, signal your intentions and try to avoid distractions.

"According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) in 2022 – the last year of complete data – motorcycle fatalities were up 1.2 percent," said Schloegel. "Motorcyclists represented 15 percent of fatalities despite only being 3 percent of the vehicles on roadways. It's everyone's responsibility to keep the roadways safe."

The Motorcycle Safety Foundation offers the following top tips for drivers and motorcyclists so that everyone can stay safe on the roadways.

For Car and Truck Drivers

Actively look for motorcyclists: Motorcyclists can easily be hidden in blind spots or by other vehicles, bushes, trees, or roadway signs, so use your eyes and mirrors to check all around you before maneuvering into or around traffic.

Focus on driving: Put down the phone; don't let pets and passengers distract you. Use your turn signals: Signal your intentions. It can help others know what to expect or even alert them to get out of your way if they are in your blind spot.

Give two-wheelers some space: Don't tailgate or get too close when you are next to riders. Give them space to maneuver and adjust to roadway conditions.

Keep it in the vehicle: Don't throw trash or cigarettes out the window. Make sure cargo is secured so it doesn't fall onto the road and become a hazard.

For Motorcycle and Scooter Riders

Be visible: Wear bright clothing and a lightcolored helmet. Always have your headlight on, day and night, and avoid riding in the blind spots of other vehicles. If possible, flash your brake light when slowing and before stopping.

• Gear up every ride: Wear proper riding gear portant resolutions and help educate the people from head to toe. Full-face helmets provide the best protection. Jackets, pants, gloves, and boots specifically made for riding will generally have abrasion-resistant material and extra armor for better protection.

> Follow the rules of the road: Riding respectfully — and legally — creates a safer environment for everyone. Unexpected maneuvers could startle or confuse others and cause a crash.

> **Before you ride, look over your bike:** Do a preride check, which includes looking over your tires and wheels, checking fluids, cables, your bike's chassis, lights and electronics, and the stands. Use the T-CLOCS inspection checklist to help.

Driver System Regulations Following Tragic Collision

Pickerington, OH (April 26, 2024) -In the wake of the most recent trage-

dy involving a fatal collision between a Tesla vehicle in autopilot mode and a motorcyclist in Washington state, the AMA once again urges the Department of Transportation to strengthen Automated Driving System (ADS) regulations.

The incident, which resulted in the death of the rider, under-

scores the urgent need for specific regulations that require that both recognition and reaction to motorcycles be fully integrated into crash avoidance and autonomous vehicle (AV) technologies to ensure safety for motorcyclists and drivers.

Since the 1990s, The AMA has engaged with federal agencies, automakers and software developers on the dangers surrounding developing and implementing self-driving technology without adequate consideration of its impact on motorcyclists.

Currently, the government has regulations in place that tells consumers what type of fuel and which engine types they should buy. Yet when it comes to an actual problem that's costing lives, the ongoing epidemic remains ignored, despite the AMA urging action.

In February of 2022, the AMA — along with the Motorcycle Industry Council (MIC) and the Motorcycle Safety Foundation (MSF) — sat down to share industry priorities with United States DOT Secretary Buttigieg and department staff. One of the key discussion points during that meeting was the need to ensure that these new automated vehicle and crash avoidance technologies be required to recognize and react appropriately to motorcycles.

Secretary Buttigieg was very receptive to our bly. concerns regarding autonomous vehicles and the potential dangers they pose to motorcyclists. Obviously, the AMA's and the industry's concerns fell on deaf ears.

The most recent testing of these systems by the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety (IIHS), just released, indicates only one of the first 10 small SUVs evaluated using their new testing criteria earned a good rating. Four of the tested vehicles either completely failed to provide sufficient warning or gave it too late to avoid a collision.

Many autonomous vehicles on the road today have not been proven to detect all other road users in all situations before they have been allowed to be used on the road. Motorcyclists should not be used as guinea pigs for autonomous vehicle manufacturers. The continued allowance of untested autonomous vehicles on our nation's roadways is unacceptable.

New Road Kill



The Cicadas are here for a few more weeks! Wearing protective gear can help reduce the risk of being hit by insects while riding a motorcycle.

Protective gear includes:



• Long pants: Such as jeans

• Riding boots: Protect your feet

• Chaps: Protect your skin

• Leather jacket: Protects your body from the weather

• Face shield or goggles: Protect your face from insects, wind, and debris Gloves: Protect your hands from bee stings

Wearing the right gear can make bugs nearly unnoticeable. You can also use a motorcycle bug shield to absorb impacts while riding smoothly and comfortably.

If you're hit by a bug in the face while riding, remain calm and gradually slow down. Being distracted and panicking can cause you to lose control and potentially get seriously injured.




