Fall Riding Season! Let's Ride!

I was going to write this Kaution Korner about winter storage, but that \$\%^& can wait!!

It's that time of the year again.... IT'S....Fall <u>riding</u> season... Hell Yeah!! Let's Do It!!!

There is still time to get out on the road and there are opportunities on the Top Cats calendar. Check them out NOW and get them on your calendar. I'll pitch **Rigsby's Ride for Screams on Oct 12**.

We all know about the importance of preparing your bike for the early riding season. TCLOCS is a great way to remember how to do this for the first spring ride. But, getting your bike and yourself ready for fall riding is important too.

Generally, when thinking of fall riding, I think of cool weather and beautiful scenery. But several cautionary items come to mind as well. Like, watching for leaves on the road, early frost (could be in shady spots anytime, even on a mild temp day), deer and other critters getting ready to hibernate, etc....

Here are some suggestions that I know will help make your fall riding safe, as well as, some you can use throughout the year:

PLAN YOUR JOURNEY:

Plan your route to make the most of daylight hours. Add on extra time for your route. More than you would normally, to do the same route during the summertime. Due to the colder conditions of riding in the fall, you may likely be stopping to warm up along the way. You'll also be tempering your speed due to more slippery road conditions. Plan that your daylight hours are few. So, pick routes that will bring you to your destination and back before dark. Another BIG items to consider for your route plan is Sun glare, which I will dig into in a section below.

CHECK THE WEATHER FORECAST:

Pick the better weather forecasted day to take your ride if you can.

CHECK YOUR MOTORCYCLE BATTERY: Be sure to charge up your motorcycle battery the night before

to ensure a full charge for your ride. Colder weather makes your battery work more and it can lose its charge quicker than under normal dry warm conditions.

CHECK YOUR TIRES: Due to colder nights and cooler temperatures, your motorcycle <u>tire pressure</u> may become low. Check your tire pressure for accuracy and proper inflation while also inspecting tread looking for worn tires. During colder weather rides, tread and pressure are equally important and necessary to ensure full grip.

COLD TIRES: Your tires will take longer to warm up during colder temperature days. Make sure the first miles of your morning ride are tackled with smoother than normal inputs (movements) as your tires and the road surface can be super slippery. Your tires will likely not warm to the point you're accustomed to in warmer temps and tires with soft rubber compounds need to warm to perform best. In the cold, they're hard and that traction can be greatly reduced. Go easy!

CHECK LIGHTING SYSTEM: Be sure all your lights are functioning and if you can, increase your lighting quality and clean your lens. Read more on our tips to BRIGHTEN UP.

MOTORCYCLE GEAR: Be warm and be visible. Keeping and staying warm is key to a successful ride, and full concentration at the handlebars. It will be chilly and though you feel warm when you start, wind-chill will quickly change that factor. Heated gear is fabulous and of course add those extra linings to your jacket and pants. Winter riding gloves work well. Don't forget to layer with performance under garments and bring extra layers if you have the room. A rain suit can be used as an added layer as well. Wear high-visibility and reflective gear to make yourself visible to drivers, even in the long shadows of a fall afternoon.

LEAVES: As leaves begin to accumulate on the roadway, they can be very slick. Dry leaves can camouflage potholes and other road irregularities. Wet/icy leaves are most slippery and can appear unexpectedly in shaded areas. Wet or dry, riding through stacks of leaves can reduce traction, making it difficult to stop. Avoid them if possible or adjust speed and trajectory.

ROAD SURFACE: Be aware of frost on the roadway in the early morning hours. Be sure to pay particular attention for frost on bridge decks or other higher surfaces, railroad crossings, and in shady areas where the morning sun may not have melted the frost yet. Adjust your riding speed for the conditions

SUN GLARE: The sun is lower in the sky at this time of year and its glare can be an issue for much of the day, depending on the direction you're riding (Plan your Journy). Along with this, as trees become barren of leaves, the patterns of light and shade can be like riding in a strobe light. This can be distracting and confusing. Good sunglasses or a tinted visor work best. Be sure not to forget your clear visor so you can switch for the ride home when it the sun is setting or down.

SPACE CUSHIONS: Give yourself enough following distance and space cushioning. It's not only difficult for you to see the road this time of year, but equally challenging for other drivers to see you. Allow extra time to react both in front and behind you. Slow down, look further ahead and increase your following distance.

DEER AND MOOSE: Autumn is the time of year deer and moose mate, meaning – they'll be more active. These animals are huge hazards for motorcyclists. Try to plan your ride during daylight hours only. The best defense is to stay aware, particularly while riding in rural areas. Scan the roadway ahead and just off the shoulders and watch for deer crossings. Typically, deer movement will peak at dusk and dawn. Areas where crops or timber are relatively close to the road will present the greatest challenge as these are ideal places for deer to cross. Unfortunately, it's these zones which provide you the shortest reaction time. Slow and prepare for the risk.

WIND: This time of year, is usually accented by gusty strong winds. These can unsettle your bike and blow you a little of course within your lane. To manage this, look for signs. For example, try looking ahead at the trees and bushes, and note the behavior of other vehicles to see how the wind is affecting them. Strong winds are not constant, they are usually gusty. So, ensure you hold the handlebar handgrip firmly. Go slow enough to cope with the gusts.

With good planning you'll be able to enjoy one of the most pleasurable and spectacular riding seasons!

Sturgis Stats 2024

While there are many ways to rate the annual Black Hills Motorcycle Rally, some statistics enhance an understanding of the rally from law enforcement's view. Hence:

Final Rally Tally Of Year

The South Dakota Highway Patrol on Sunday released its final Rally Tally Statistics

- **2024 Total Vehicles entered**: 470.987.
- Previous 5-year Average: 488,720
- The patrol reported no fatal crashes in the area Saturday, The final **number of deaths** on the year remain at 3.
- There were two **injury crashes** investigated by the patrol on Saturday, sending the yearly total to 35. That is below last year's 64. As for **non-injury crashes**, the patrol reported 54, which was down from last year's 58.
- As for **drug arrests**, the patrol listed 281 misdemeanor drug arrests and 163 felony drug arrests. Those numbers are up from last year's 246 and 155 respectively.
- **D.U.I. arrests** totaled 155 this year, up from last year's 120.
- Cash seized by the patrol was well ahead of last year. The patrol reported over \$71,500 seized this year. Last year, the patrol only reported just over \$2,000 was seized.
- In Sturgis, police ended Saturday with 146 parking citations: 17 ahead of last year's 129.
- Sturgis Police also reported another 5 citations for underage consumption or possession of alcohol. That sends the total number through Saturday to 20.
- Police also report a total of 43 fights and domestic disturbance calls this year.
- In all, Sturgis Police listed 231 non-traffic arrests and 263 traffic arrests. The number of people booked into the Meade County Jail was 172 – ahead of last year's 131 on this date.

Surviving Intersections

is because cars either don't see us or they misjudge our our sport. approach speed or distance. Here are some tips to help you become more visible at intersections.

- **Don't Hide.** Select lane positions that put you in open view to be seen. This means not tailgating the car in front and riding in the left or right portion of your lane to make sure drivers waiting to turn into or across your lane can clearly see you.
- Move within your lane. Don't assume drivers see you. People see what they expect to see and a motorcycle may not register in their consciousness, even if they are looking at you. Realize that you appear stationary if you reduce the likelihood of accidents. approach a driver straight on. Even if drivers see you they may not be able to accurately judge closing speed and approach distance because of your relatively narrow frontal side area of your bike.
- Proceed Thru an intersection with "Help". Entering an intersection adjacent to another vehicle enhances the chances that you will be seen. Even though the vehicle next to you is the one that they see.
- Be Bright. Wear brightly colored riding gear that gets attention and separates you from the busy background. This includes wearing a light-colored helmet and jacket or vest, as well as putting reflective material on your bike and riding gear for being seen in low light situations.
- Don't rely on noise. While loud pipes get attention, sound is not reliable for telling drivers exactly where you are. Loud pipes direct most of the exhaust noise rearward rather than forward where the majority of dangers materialize. Selective use of an aftermarket horn is as effective and a lot less annoying to others.
- **Be ready.** Even after using these measures you will likely encounter drivers who invade your right or way. Being mentally ready makes you more likely to approach cautiously and respond skillfully when someone cuts you off. Being ready means actively looking for trouble, slowing down and covering your brakes before approaching intersections even when everything looks to be in order.

The best riders predict that a driver might cut them off and are already prepared by covering their brakes and positioning themselves to give maximum time and space to respond.

Some of the most common myths:

Motorcycles Are More Dangerous Than Cars

While bikes present higher risks due to lack of enclosure and visibility, the U.S. National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) reports that motorcycling can be relatively safe with proper safety measures. For users who wear helmets, the risk of head injury is decreased by 69% and the risk of death by 37%. Additionally, defensive riding courses and advanced rider training can significantly

Motorcyclists Are Arrogant, Obnoxious and Reck-

The stereotype of the reckless biker comes from movies area. One tip is to move across your lane as you approach and TV shows, which don't reflect reality. Responsible drivers at intersections to visually "present" the broader riding is a core value among most motorcyclists, who understand the importance of protective gear and adherence to traffic laws. According to a study by the Motorcycle Industry Council (MIC), most motorcyclists prioritize safety, with 74% of riders wearing helmets and 66% taking courses.

♦ Only Men Ride Motorcycles

The MIC's 2018 survey revealed that women represent nearly 19% of motorcycle owners in the United States, up from 10% in 2009. Numerous female riding clubs and organizations, such as the Women's International Motorcycle Association (WIMA), support this increase. Women riders are also making their mark in professional racing and adventure motorcycling, challenging the outdated notion that motorcycling is a male-dominated activity.

Motorcycles Are for the Young

This is sooo untrue. Data from the MIC shows that the average age of motorcycle owners in the U.S. has risen to 50 years. The records indicate many older users find motorcycling rewarding and enjoyable. Manufacturers like Harley-Davidson and BMW have recognized this trend, offering bikes with features tailored to older bikers, such as lower seat heights, advanced ergonomics, and easier handling.

♦ Loud Pipes Save Lives

Most crashes occur because car drivers don't see the motorcycle, not because they don't hear it. Adequate All the best practices in the world sometimes cannot pre- measures include wearing bright, reflective clothing, using

You Don't Need Special Gear

The importance of wearing specialized motorcycle gear cannot be overstated. The NHTSA reports that helmets are 37% effective in preventing fatal injuries for bikers and 41% for passengers. Additionally, armored jackets, pants, gloves, and boots significantly reduce the risk of severe injuries. For example, padded jackets can prevent abrasions and impact injuries, while motorcycle boots protect feet and ankles in a

Many electric bikes, such as the Zero SR/F and the Harley-Davidson LiveWire, offer zero emissions and are becoming more popular. Such advancements highlight the industry's efforts to reduce motorcycles' environmental impact.

Motorcyclists Have a Death Wish

This misconception stems from the perception of motorcycling as an inherently dangerous activity. However, most motorcyclists are passionate about riding for the sense of freedom, adventure, and community it provides. They value their protection and ride for the enjoyment and practical benefits it offers. Several bikers take advanced riding classes and wear appropriate protective gear. An MSF survey showed that responsible riders are concerned about their safety and take steps to mitigate risks.



Riding on **Gravel**

Riding on gravel can be challenging and requires following a few techniques.

Avoid Becoming Tense

It's important to

keep your arms and legs loose while riding on gravel to ensure you have proper traction and don't slip around on the small rocks and pebbles on the ground. You also want to avoid making sudden movements which can lead to losing control of the motorcycle.

Watch Your Speed

Inspect the Motorcycle

Perform a thorough inspection of your motorcycle to ensure everything is working correctly after riding in gravel to look for rocks that may be stuck in the brakes, tires, etc. Look for leaks in the tires and check your springs and shocks on your suspension system to determine if they need attention or repairs.


European Answer to Decibel Laws

Some of you who rode on Adler 24 this year may have seen some bikes with butterflies in the exhaust pipes. This reflects an genious way to get around yet abide by European decibel limits motorcycles. EU import laws require bikes to meet a certain decibel limit at specific RPM. So, the motor company designed system where the butterfly in the picture would close to quiet the bike at those specified RPM limits. At other RPM, like wide open throttle, the butterfly remains wide open.

◆ Looking at a possible Saturday date – June 14 or 21 – for next year.





- ► Attend the Group Riding and Safety Seminar within your first year then once every three years of membership.
- ► All dues or any other financial obligations have been met.

Ride Safe and Vote, Vote, Vote!

The most important thing we do in Top Cats is safe riding. The second most important thing we do is smart voting. Our riding season has been a safe one and now it's time to vote in our annual Club elections.

For the 2024 - 2025 term, consistent with our By Laws, we have the following five position vacancies and current qualified incumbents or nominees:

I. Vice President (2025-2026):

Requirements for Vice President

- 1. Be a Full Member in good standing for 3 consecutive years prior to the date of the election.
- 2. Have served as a committee chairperson for one year or have served a minimum of one year in any Board position.
- 3. Have no history of disciplinary action.

II. Secretary (2025-2026):

Requirements for Secretary

- 1. Have been a Full Member in good standing for 1 year prior to the date of the election.
- 2. Have no history of disciplinary action.

III. Treasurer (2025-2026):

Requirements for Treasurer

- 1. Have been a Full Member in good standing for 1 year prior to the date of the election.
- 2. Have no history of disciplinary action.

IV. <u>Two Directors (2025- 2026):</u>

Requirements for Director

- 1. Be a Full member in good standing for 12 months prior to the date of election.
- 2. Have served as a committee member for one year or have served a minimum of one year in any Board position.
- 3. Have no history of disciplinary action.

Nominations for Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer and two Directors will be accepted up to 1 November via email to wkirkpal77@aol.com, or in person. When you find yourself faced with a nomination decision, simply look at your choices and determine who has the best interest of the Club at heart, who has a proven record of dedication to the Club, who has the experience for that particular position and, if all else is a tie, ask yourself who you see at every ride, every meeting, every committee activity, every Club event, and every charity ride. That should help you decide.

Nominees will be vetted for eligibility and the slate will be reviewed and approved by our Board in November. Voting will take place at our 5 December general meeting and our new Board will take office on 1 January 2024. Our ballot -voting procedures will be explained in the November and December issues of ROAR.
